Aldersgate Day, or Wesley Day,

Observed on 24 May.

It recalls the day in 1738 when <u>Anglican</u> priest, <u>John Wesley</u>, reluctantly attended a group meeting that evening in a <u>Moravian</u> meeting house (the <u>Fetter Lane Society</u>) on <u>Aldersgate Street</u> in London in <u>Aldersgate</u>, London, It was there, while someone was reading from <u>Martin Luther</u>'s Preface to the <u>Epistle to the Romans</u>, that he felt that his heart was "strangely warmed." He describes it as follows:

"I felt I did trust in Christ, Christ alone, for salvation; and an assurance was given me that he had taken away my sins, even mine, and saved me from the law of sin and death."

This was the pivotal event in Wesley's life that ultimately led to the development of the Methodist movement in Britain and America.

An enthusiastic supporter of Methodist heritage and instigator of the Aldersgate John Wesley Flame Memorial, (erected in 1981 at high-walk level, in modern Nettleton Court was **Richard Martin Phillips Ludlow (**1931-2004)

Born into a staunchly Methodist family, Martin was educated at <u>The Leys</u> <u>School</u> and, after his National Service, at King's College, London, where he studied law. The London Chamber of Commerce and Industry awarded him a Fellowship and he was also made a Freeman of the City of London. A member at Putney Methodist Church and a <u>local preacher</u> for 45 years, he was actively involved with <u>Wesley's Chapel</u>.

He instigated the Aldersgate John Wesley Flame Memorial and its erection in 1981 at high-walk level, in modern Nettleton Court, and the replica statue of Wesley in the grounds of St. Paul's Cathedral.

The Flame Memorial marks as closely as possible the street level location of the original conversion place of John Wesley in old Nettleton Court in eighteenth century London.

Martin was also the inspiration behind the Charles Wesley Hymn Choir of which our editor, Gillian, was director.

Quilters Exhibition


This year the Guildford Quilters will be holding their 3 yearly exhibition at Place Farm Barn. (See poster on next page)

For those who went 3 years ago in Holy Trinity Church in the High street and 6 years ago in Clandon House, it was an opportunity not to be missed to see the most exquisite quilts hanging from the ceilings of these historic buildings.

The quilts escaped the fire in Clandon House two days before the fire broke out. So, as soon as we had a safe fortnight, in Holy Trinity in 2020, we were planning where to exhibit in 2023.

It is rare to meet an idle quilter so off we went to buy fabric for producing quilts. It was just at the beginning of the Covid period and we were not able to have our monthly meetings. Yet, on the quiet, we have produced a stunning collection which will be on display from 10-15 May.

Hopefully it will wet your appetite to have a go at this wonderful art of playing with fabric and designs. There will be demonstrations, traders tables to buy your needles and everything a starter needs..... raffles and Tombola, cushions and handmade gifts , books for beginners and for the advanced. The quilts will be hanging on walls in a very old building. The first resident moved in around 1425.



There is a special team led by Doreen Plumage, who founded The Guildford Quilters, over 40 years ago. They will hang the quilts on poles and frames according to colour, size and design. Stewards are walking around to explain how the quilts have been made.

When your eyes are completely absorbed by the colours and designs, do give them a rest by walking in the beautifully designed gardens, and have a rest in the tearoom.





