

Message for March

What book are you reading at the moment, a biography, a 'who-dun-it,' a historical novel?

Look no further for your next read than the Old Testament book of Esther. It could fall into any of these categories.

Esther is one of the great women of the Bible; a woman of good judgement, exceptional self-control, and of great self-sacrifice, yet she appears in one of only two Old Testament books where God is not explicitly mentioned. However God is very much present in her life of Esther and that of Mordecai whose faith inspires the drama.

A truth found throughout Scripture is that God often chooses to work in the world through human beings and human circumstances and this is never more so than in this book.

Paul said – *Phil.2:13* "for it is God who works in you to will and to act in order to fulfil his good purpose; and in **2 Corinthians 6:1** we are "God's co-workers," and **Martin Luther** once wrote - "God himself will milk the cows through him whose vocation that is. He who engages in the lowliness of his work performs God's work, be he lad or king."

'Esther' is the book we have are studying in the Tuesday morning Bible Study group on the 2nd & 4th Tuesdays of each month. One of those attending had found the story so gripping she had read the whole book in one go!

"Who knows, if it is for such a time as this that you have become queen?"

This was no easy path. Esther would risk death by entering the king's presence uninvited and by revealing her race and her faith.

Where are you, where am I, in our own life's journey, at this moment? What risks would we take? Could it be that God has placed us exactly where we are – "for such a time as this"?

A wintry walk - Pauline Daniels

We climbed the hill to St. Martha's - Luke, the dogs and me. As we climbed we entered the clouds, hardly anyone around. On reaching the top the church was clear but surrounded by mist. It was a magic moment - just us in the cloud with the church in full view.

Local Arrangement - An Iona style Service

It was a surprise to come to church and discover we would choose a table to sit around with others, making about 6 groups.

Following her experience as a volunteer at the Iona Community, Helen led using the Morning Service liturgy that is used daily on Iona. It has set leader and congregation responses, and Gillian taught us some new songs which we enjoyed singing in different parts, creating a good sound all together. We also sang hymns.

The passage from **Micah 6:8** was the focus of the service.

"What does the Lord require of you but to do justice, love kindness and walk humbly with your God?"

We were encouraged to discuss in our groups what this passage meant to us as individuals and as a church. It was a free discussion and, in my view, benefitted from not having to feedback immediately afterwards. Helen gathered any written comments and I will summarise these. However, it was the conversation that was most important and valuable, and more was discussed than captured in writing. H

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WHAT DOES THE LORD REQUIRE OF
YOU?

What does the Lord require of you – to do justice.

We thought of the many inequalities in society here and across the world. Often it is not easy to know how to address these.

As individuals, we are required to act when we hear people are being subject to injustice, for example when we hear racist, sexist or other prejudiced attitudes, we should challenge these and support those people. It takes courage to confront others. Sometimes we may be afraid of the backlash.

Remembering we are all equal, and all equally loved by God, therefore we want to make sure we treat everyone equally and try to be aware of power imbalances and respond to these individually and as a Church.

Although we are all equal, we are different; accepting people as they are and getting to know them individually and as a church, is important in expressing our values in action.

We pray for unity.

We are required to pray for justice on a wider level in the world. Sometimes we feel it is too big a problem and can feel overwhelmed or disempowered. Action is difficult individually at this level.

We can give financially in support of organisations that promote justice individually and we do this as a church with commitments to particular charities on an annual basis and monthly basis.

What does the Lord require of you – to love kindness

It may be that loving kindness is an easier requirement. We considered ways to show kindness individually and as a church.

Always be kind to all, be respectful. This includes forgiving others; none of us is perfect.

Try to understand other people's point of view. Also never put anyone down or humiliate others in any way. We notice often people pay kindness forward. Helping and supporting others is an act of kindness and a privilege. Love is not love till you give it away.

What does the Lord require of you – to walk humbly with your God

Seek God. Learn from Jesus' life.

Learn from listening to preaching.

These things will help us to become more Christ-like.

We are all a work in progress; don't put yourself down.

Walking humbly includes acting responsibly without needing praise.



Walker's talk

A Photographic Tour of the Monopoly board Iris Walker

Last month Peter wrote about our lecture on the history of Monopoly at the Arts Society. This is the second part of that occasion.

In 1935 Waddington Games bought the UK and Commonwealth rights to the game and it was put into production the following year. Representatives from their base in Leeds came to London to make decisions about the streets they would use. With the aid of a six metre screen, Roger Mendham, an accomplished photographer, took us around the board, beginning with the least and progressing to the most expensive streets.

Old Kent Road was the only one south of the Thames and was chosen because there was a popular song of the same name at that time.

Whitechapel was infamous for Jack the Ripper.

The Angel, Islington, is a former pub, not a street. In 1935 it was a Lyon's Corner House.

Pentonville, named after Henry Penton who developed the area, was well known for its prison.

Euston Road with its first intercity railway station in London claimed a position on the board.

Pall Mall was based on the game, "pelle – melle", a cross between golf and croquet. The playing area for this was next to St. James's Park.

Whitehall was memorable for the execution of Charles 1.

Northumberland Avenue is linked with Sherlock Holmes novel, "The Hound of the Baskervilles" (1901) and The Northumberland Arms was a pub frequented by Holmes. Now there is a Victorian themed pub there named The Sherlock Holmes.

The next section was linked with the law.

Bow Street was the location of the "Bow Street Runners".

Marlborough Magistrates Court explains the square named *Marlborough* (*Square*) because there was no Marlborough Street in this area of London. It was the location of the shop, Philip Morris Co., who first sold Marlboro cigarettes manufactured in the U.S.A.

Vine Street was the shortest one at 70 feet but was associated with the law and its 18 th . century courthouse.

The Strand and Fleet Street lead on to Trafalgar Square with the famous bronze lions designed by Sir Edwin Landseer and guarding the base of Nelson's Column.

186 Fleet Street was the location of Sweeney Todd, the infamous barber.

85 Fleet Street, designed by Lutyens, was the home of the Press Association and Reuters news agency where my husband, Peter, began his journalistic career in London.

Leicester Square is the centre of theatre land with its statue of William Shakespeare and

Piccadilly has the Royal Academy. Fortnum and Masons, who are still there after 300 years, were the first shop to sell Heinz baked beans in the UK. Did you know that?

Coventry Street connects Piccadilly to Leicester Square. It was a centre of entertainments and had the first Lyons and Co.

Regent Street, Oxford Street and Bond Street were grouped as retail centres, BUT Bond Street does not exist as a street. It's the name of an underground station between Marble Arch and Oxford Circus. New Bond Street is to the north and Old Bond Street is to the south. Bond Street has always been in two sections like that. The famous Roosevelt/Churchill sculpture, Allies On A Bench, is on New Bond Street, but this was created long after the Monopoly board was created.

Our final destinations, Park Lane and Mayfair, were put alongside Super Tax!

The four stations, King's Cross, Marylebone, Fenchurch Street and

Liverpool Street were termini of L.N.E.R. before nationalisation of the railways in 1947.

I hope you enjoyed our little trip around the 22 streets. The photography was stunning.

A rich land owner with a racing stud of 17 horses compiled a will to ensure hereditary succession. He left 1/2 of his possessions to his son, 1/3rd to his grandson and 1/9 to his nephew. The inevitable day arrived.

It was easy divvying most of the estate but the stable was a headache which stifled the three recipients. A bitter, noisy feud erupted which reverberated throughout the locality. None would give ground. The problem was that half of 17 equines would result in 8.5 horses. Killing a valuable commodity was senseless. The difficulty was compounded because another third of 17 horses produced 5.67 animals and one ninth generated yet another fatality.

An immediate neighbour with only one horse in a small stable, got so upset at the dissension and disruption that he donated his only horse to the family with no strings attached. What a great change was produced! Half of 18 horses gave nine of them to the son, grandson got one third of 18 which was six and nephew got one ninth which was two horses. The men now realised that 9 + 6 + 2 = 17. That left one spare horse. The grateful family donated it to "Samaritan" as a mark of respect, kindness and appreciation for their dilemma.

SCAMS

Parcel deliveries

These scams often begin with text messages or emails claiming to be from delivery services. The messages might state that you have a package waiting or that there's an issue requiring your attention and pre-payment is required.

Engaging with these can lead to identity theft and/or financial loss.

- **Verify delivery notifications:** Always check directly with the delivery company through their official website or app rather than clicking on links in unsolicited messages.
- **Avoid unsolicited packages:** If you receive a package you didn't order or a request to pay for an unsolicited delivery, be cautious. Report any such incidents to the delivery company and avoid interacting with suspicious messages.

NB

- If it sounds too good to be true, it probably is!!
- NEVER give out personal banking details, especially PIN numbers. If you are asked for these you are almost certainly being scammed.
- Do not click on links in Emails if you are not absolutely certain who they are from.
- Fraudsters masquerade plausibly as your Bank/ the Police/Tax and Pensions offices etc.......If a caller purports to be the police or your bank regarding fraudulent activity on a debit /credit card and suggests that you phone the Customer Services number on the back of your card to confirm that they are who they say they are – do not do this.
 The fraudster keeps the line open and you will only be speaking with them again, not your bank!
