# My Sabbatical Journey: October To December 2024 A Journey of Discovery: Europe and Beyond Ghana

I had the privilege of embarking on a sabbatical journey, a time for renewal and reflection after 38 years of dedicated service in ministry. This precious period allowed me to step back, recharge, and return with renewed energy and insights to serve our community.

#### **Ghana: A Focus on Pastoral Care**

My sabbatical began with a deeply enriching seven weeks in Ghana. I had the opportunity to work with theological seminary students, Churches and groups, focusing on crucial aspects of effective pastoral care:

- **Self-Care:** We explored the importance of pastors prioritizing their own well-being, recognizing that they cannot pour from an empty cup.
- **Safeguarding:** I emphasized the critical need for robust safeguarding practices to ensure the safety and protection of vulnerable individuals within the church. Even though the concept seems new and may take years to take root within organisations, workplaces and in Churches.
- **Sexual Ethics:** I engaged in thoughtful discussions on human sexuality, navigating challenging topics with sensitivity and respect. While discussions on transgender issues and cohabitation presented unique complexities, they provided valuable opportunities for learning and growth.

#### A European Odyssey: From Alpine Peaks to Irish Shores

My sabbatical then took me on a journey of discovery across Europe. I marvelled at the breath-taking beauty of the Swiss Alps in Zurich, the Austrian Alps in Salzburg (birthplace of Mozart), and the Krimml waterfall (the fifth largest in the world). I also explored the Jura Mountain range, extending over 225 miles across France and Switzerland, experiencing the serenity of the mountains and valleys.

In Northern Ireland, I was captivated by the awe-inspiring power of the rivers and the rich history reflected in the architecture of Belfast. I spent three days in a Catholic Monastery and two days in a Retreat centre before returning to the UK.

# Exploring the UK: From the Midlands, Bedfordshire, Buckinghamshire to the Fens in Cambridgeshire.

While in the UK, I visited various locations, including Coventry, Leamington Spa, Birmingham, Rugby, Warwick, Dudley, Walsall, Rusden, Milton Keynes, Aylesbury, Luton, and the picturesque village of Stone in Buckinghamshire. I spent two days in the Fens, driving through Wisbech, Kings Lynn, Swaffham with the finest of Georgian buildings, and the town of March in Cambridgeshire, admiring the rivers and flatlands. These visits provided valuable opportunities to share my experiences of ministry with churches and groups, learning from them while simultaneously reflecting on the joys and challenges of 38 years of service. I also learned that the Midlands were once part of the Kingdom of Mercia in the early medieval period.

The final 12 days of my sabbatical were dedicated to rest and reflection. I used this time to process my experiences, to reconnect with my own spiritual journey, and to discern God's calling for the next chapter of my ministry.

I return from my sabbatical with renewed strength, a deeper understanding of the challenges facing our world, and a renewed commitment to serving our Church community with compassion, integrity, and wisdom.

I am deeply grateful to each of you for your prayers and support during my sabbatical. Your encouragement and well wishes would have meant the world to me, especially from the members of my sabbatical committee who helped put all the pastoral care arrangements in place. Indeed, sabbatical is a gift, and I am eternally grateful to God, the church, and my family.

On behalf of my family and on my own behalf, I say "Merci beaucoup" "Danke" – Thank you.

#### Whatever happened to Yellow Pages?

Revd. Allan Taylor's circuit letter about the nineteenth century poet and hymn writer, Dora Greenwell, who was a friend of Christina Rossetti and Elizabeth Barrett Browning, had a special resonance for me. She lived in Lanchester, County Durham and I used to live near her, but not in the nineteenth century!!

This circuit letter from Allan led me to reflect how, unwittingly, many of you contributed to a lasting memorial to her. How?

At the beginning of the 21st. century we were encouraged to pass in our old Yellow Pages directories for recycling. The Woodland Trust was a beneficiary of this scheme and received almost £500,000 from Yell. Working with the Woodland Trust, a project was created and designed by the local community of Lanchester. Over 2,000 native trees and shrubs plus wild flowers were planted in more than 8 acres just a few hundred metres from where Dora Greenwell had lived, and it was named DORA'S WOOD.

Sadly, with the passage of time, now my connection with the village is limited to Christmas card news, but DORA'S WOOD will last forever. Thank you Allan for stirring some memories.

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





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Notes for the following Poetry page

Robert Louis Stevenson was born in 1850 and died in 1894 in his island home in Samoa.

He was a Scottish novelist, poet, essayist, and travel writer, but is probably best known for the classics: Treasure Island, A Child's Garden of Verses, Kidnapped, and Strange Case of Dr. Jekyll and Mr. Hyde. The poems overleaf capture the days before the luxury of central heating, when Victorian children (and grown-ups) endured getting out of their beds into icy bedrooms, but found their imaginations captured, once fires were lit later in the day, gazing at the flickering flames.

**Texts** — purporting to be from people you know, asking you to buy gift cards on their behalf for a friend or relative in need. These are now common scams. Do not respond.

from the post office or delivery-firm re. an undelivered parcel, asking you to contact them to arrange a new date – DON'T

OR

asking for payment for re-delivery - Don't Respond

Phone calls — cold calls, apparently from your bank or the police, asking you to contact them immediately because of fraudulent use of a card.

- DON'T

IF IN DOUBT - DON'T

**NEVER GIVE PERSONAL OR BANKING DETAILS** 

Your bank, or the police, will never call you and ask you to move money to a new account on any pretext, however plausible.!!!!!!

<u>Hang up</u> and then phone your bank on a number you know to be correct so that you can confirm that all is well.

## Scam Parking-fine texts

The text says a parking charge notice was issued by a local council and provides a link for online payment. It asks for immediate payment and threatens prosecution if the fine is not paid.

<u>delete</u> the message

don't click on any payment link

don't give any personal information.
