Dear Friends,

"Leprosy is one of the 21 neglected tropical diseases [NTD;s] that devastate lives across the world,

Action for Children Patron The Princess of Wales made a surprise visit to one of the largest women's prisons in the UK HMP Styal in Cheshire: a closed category jail for adult female and young offenders over the age of 18 years. As the patron of AFC she visited the jail's Mother and Baby Unit (MBU) to highlight how important 'strong, loving and consistent' relationships are to child's development, even in the most challenging of environments. The Princess heard from current prisoners about the support they and their babies were receiving from Action for Children. Since 2022 AFC has run three MBU's in jails in the North of England providing a'safe space' for new expectant mothers serving a sentence or on remand.

An Invitation to Ghana

A group recently returned from Ghana.

Anyone from the circuit is welcome to join the next trip; you will love it! (visa and other needs would be taken care of by the organisers.)

Saturday 24th January to Thursday 5th February 2026.

Certified by the British and Ghana Conferences.

The overall objective is to learn about the life and ministry of the Methodist Church Ghana and explore the faith in the Ghanaian context by interacting with both the clergy and lay in the urban and rural settings, to learn from the dynamic growth of the Methodist Church Ghana and how this has been achieved and understand the concept of mission and evangelism, to engage with the history of Methodism and the history of the slave trade and visit projects that are being or have been sponsored by the Methodist Church Britain as well as visit places of interest.

The brief itinerary includes:

Paying a courtesy call on the staff at the Conference Office in Accra Visiting the Methodist Rafiki Satellite Village (Orphanage) in the Winneba Diocese, to have a session with the children.

A visit to Cape Coast Castle, to be briefed about the slave trade and visit Sekondi Diocese.

Engagement with young people, men's and women's fellowship Visits to educational institutions and Health Clinics

In the Northern Region (Tamale/Yendi), we will visit another area to explore the relationship between Christians and Muslims and we will visit some of the rural Methodist Churches to interact with the local people.

The total cost involved is £2,200, and includes the flight, hotel accommodation, air conditioned coach hire, meals and other miscellaneous expenses. Payment of £1,000 by Wednesday 15th October 2025 and the remaining amount will be collected at the airport before we depart to Ghana. We are humbly inviting you to be part of this exciting trip to Ghana. Contact me for any information if interested.

"UNLOCK" ANNUAL LONDON SPONSORED WALK SATURDAY 12th APRIL 2025

This year's Annual London Walk organised by Unlock, a small Christian Mission organisation, is a little earlier than usual. Our church has been supporting these walks since the very first one in 1984. This year it's the 42nd London Walk and I'm hoping that we can continue to support this event both through walking and sponsorship.

Details of this year's walking route will be on the Church Notice Board together with a sponsorship sheet nearer the time.

The Annual London Walk is the main source of income for Unlock who are a small and dedicated Christian charity supporting the work of Christian Mission within inner city and deprived urban areas. They do this by helping to make the messages of the Gospel relevant to those who would not normally attend church or read the Bible. Unlock supports and funds project workers working in deprived urban areas who offer both practical help and emotional support as well as sharing the good news of the gospel. These projects have been shown to make a real difference to those attending. Unlock workers will have a presentation and display of their work at Brandon Baptist Church, one of the churches we will be visiting during the walk.

This year's walk is 8 miles long and is around the Kennington, Camberwell, Brixton, Stockwell and Battersea areas of South London. Don't be put off by the length of the walk as we take our time, and rest and refreshments stops are provided at selected churches along the way. There is also the option of covering part of the route by bus for weary walkers! I hope that previous Unlock walkers will be able to join us again this year and any new walkers would be warmly welcomed.

Unlock has provided the following description of this year's route which can be started at any number of different points:

"Battersea and Brixton and in between is where the Unlock Walk will be. The biggest landmark we'll see is Battersea Power Station, one of the largest brick buildings in the world, now an upmarket shopping and residential complex having been derelict for decades after closing in 1983. The route will then loop towards Brixton and Windrush Square, with its celebration and archive of Caribbean people's experiences in the UK. We'll go by some very well-known places such as the Oval cricket ground and also take you to some more surprising places."

The Unlock London walks always offer an interesting and unique experience. Hundreds of walkers from a variety of churches across London and the South East join in the walk and there is always a good sense of fellowship. The walks cover different areas of London each year, both well-known and some less well-known areas. Walkers experience a range of very different communities often living in close proximity to each other.

During the walk a number of different denominational churches (6 this year), are visited where there is the opportunity to learn more about the role each church plays within its local community. Most churches we visit provide interesting displays and fact sheets about their role and work within their local communities. There are always volunteers and church members present to provide more information and to answer any questions.

The walk will be an all-day event and we will travel to London by train and then public transport to the start of the walk. Details of timings will be confirmed nearer the date but there is usually an early start between 8.30-9am returning late afternoon. Comfortable sturdy shoes are a must and it's a good idea to bring some light refreshments as we never know in advance which churches will be providing refreshments. Walkers also need to bring some small change for donations at the churches visited.

Walkers are encouraged to ask family and friends to sponsor them and there will be a group sponsorship list on the Church Notice Board.

I hope that people will once again feel able to sponsor this year's walkers so that we can in turn support the work of Unlock who do such a good job on very limited resources.

Please let me know if you'd like to join this years' walk and do ask if you'd like any further information about Unlock or the walk.



An early April Fools's joke?

SCAMS

Parcel deliveries

These scams often begin with text messages or emails claiming to be from delivery services. The messages might state that you have a package waiting or that there's an issue requiring your attention and pre-payment is required.

Engaging with these can lead to identity theft and/or financial loss.

- **Verify delivery notifications:** Always check directly with the delivery company through their official website or app rather than clicking on links in unsolicited messages.
- **Avoid unsolicited packages:** If you receive a package you didn't order or a request to pay for an unsolicited delivery, be cautious. Report any such incidents to the delivery company and avoid interacting with suspicious messages.

NB

- If it sounds too good to be true, it probably is!!
- NEVER give out personal banking details, especially PIN numbers. If you are asked for these you are almost certainly being scammed.
- Do not click on links in Emails if you are not absolutely certain who they are from.
- Fraudsters masquerade plausibly as your Bank/ the Police/Tax and Pensions offices etc.......If a caller purports to be the police or your bank regarding fraudulent activity on a debit /credit card and suggests that you phone the Customer Services number on the back of your card to confirm that they are who they say they are – do not do this.
 The fraudster keeps the line open and you will only be speaking with them again, not your bank!
