Beyond Lip Service

Dear Friends in the Faith,

As we journey through this sacred season of Lent, which began with Ash Wednesday, we are called to a time of introspection and renewal. Jesus' words, "These people honour me with their lips, but their hearts are far from me," resonate deeply within us, challenging us to reflect on the authenticity of our faith.

Let me share Lily's story with you. She faithfully attends church every Sunday, singing praise songs and reciting prayers. Yet, over the years, she has found herself merely going through the motions, each week feeling more like a checklist than a heartfelt expression of devotion. 
Now our choir is small in number perhaps you could augment it just for this occasion so that we can have an item by 'The Merrow Methodist Singers.'

SCAMS

Royal Mail text

A dodgy text impersonating Royal Mail tells you that your parcel can't be delivered due to 'missing or damaged address information. It then provides a link to 'update your details' designed to steal your personal and payment information.

Criminals claiming to represent energy firms and selling goods at inflated prices may claim

- They are working on a neighbour's address, noticed you need work completed and they have left over materials.
- They may inspect areas you can't access, for example the loft or roof and show you photos/videos as evidence that you need urgent repairs

Beware : these images may not even be of your property.

Always ask for identification and tell them to wait outside whilst you check this by calling the company. **DO NOT use the phone number on the person's ID card.**

How to protect yourself

• If you are not happy about a person's identity, do not let them into your house <u>under any circumstances</u>.

- Take time to consider your options and research costs from other providers.
- If you feel pressured have the confidence to be firm and say no.

• Call the citizens advice consumer helpline following a doorstep caller on 03454 04 05 06.

Fake emails, texts or WhatsApp

1. Offering discounts on energy bills.

2. Claiming a relationship and that they have lost or changed their phone. Do not reply, but report a scam text :

forward the text to 7726

forward a scam email to report@phishing.gov.uk
