Message for May <u>From The Reverend Peter Hills</u> He was cut off from the land of the living, stricken for the transgression of my people. (Isaiah 53.8) For you will not abandon my soul to death, nor suffer your faithful one to see the pit. (Psalm 16.10) Jesus is risen, alleluia! Worship and praise him, alleluia! Now our Redeemer bursts from the grave; lost to the tomb, Christ rises to save. (StF 304 v.1)

The cheering crowd's 'Hosanna!' is now an echo. The baying crowd's 'Crucify him!' is silenced. We have gazed upon the man on the cross and wept tears of sorrow. We have stood beside Mary in the Garden, looked with her upon the risen Lord and wept tears of joy. In the church's life we are now in the fifty days of Easter, and every prayer is lifted by an Alleluia! The climax at the end of these fifty days will be Pentecost.

The readings for the Sundays following Easter Day continue to celebrate the Resurrection: the coming of the risen Christ to the disciples, and later his Ascension into heaven – in other words, the moment when Jesus said his final farewells to those who loved him, with the promise of return – and the coming of the Holy Spirit, transforming, teaching, enlightening, sanctifying, beautifying, strengthening and loving.

During these fifty days, we also hear readings from the book of Acts, and the intention is that these should always be included, if necessary replacing the Old Testament reading. It is very much a season of 'what happened next'. Of Peter and John healing in the name of Jesus: the choosing of seven deacons, to distribute food and minister to Greek-speaking Jews; of martyrdom: James the brother of John is beheaded, Stephen, one of the new deacons, is stoned; and of mission: Philip to Samaria and towards Gaza; and Saul the Pharisee, sent to capture followers of Jesus and himself captured, body and soul, by the risen Jesus – leading to the spreading of the Good News to gentiles and pagans.

These readings describe the crucible in which our New Testament was fashioned, from the memories of those who were there, passed on to a new generation. They remind us of our birth as a church. Through it all, Jesus is still at work, the risen Jesus, for ever scarred and pierced, as present as he ever was, though now invisible. It is our story, as much as the story of Peter and Paul and the rest.

The story is rooted in history: real people, real places. Yet it is a Truth for today. It is a truth for those suffering in war, under despotic rule, grieving deeply, struggling to stay afloat, wondering whether life is worth living at all; for people of faith and no faith.

I have been enjoying a documentary series following a diverse group of 'celebrities' along a pilgrim route in Austria and Switzerland. As well as enjoying scenery I know

well and love, it has been uplifting to hear people talk of faith and life. They include an agnostic and a Muslim, and share their beliefs and doubts in a respectful and – there's no other word for it – loving way.

That may be all that we are able to do;

but we have a treasure to share which I think trumps all others:

Go and tell others, Christ is alive! Love is eternal, faith and hope thrive. What God intended, Jesus fulfilled; what God conceives can never be killed. Christ is arisen! Now all can see how humankind is meant to be free. Though powers of darkness threaten their worst, through every barrier, Jesus has burst. (ibid. verses 4 & amp; 5)

Every blessing in this Easter period. Peter

FAMILY NEWS


Happy family news for the Winders earlier this year - Chris Winder pictured with his daughter Zoe following her marriage to Mike Ryan on 18th January 2025.




Who played with a Dangerous Toy, and suffered a Catastrophe of considerable Dimensions

VARLEY'S PARLEZ

This is an old story which has appeared many times over the years, but is well worth another airing:

A company chairman was given a ticket for a performance of Schubert's Symphony No8, 'The Unfinished. He had another appointment that evening and so passed the ticket on to the company's 'work-study consultant . The next morning the chairman asked how the consultant had enjoyed it, but instead of a few words of thanks and comments the consultant handed him a memorandum which read as follows:

- a) For considerable periods the four oboe players had nothing to do. Their number should be reduced and their work spread over the whole orchestra, thus eliminating peaks of inactivity.
- b) All twelve violins were playing identical notes. This seems unnecessary duplication and the staff of this section should be drastically cut. If a large volume of sound is required, electronic amplification could be used.
- c) Much effort was absorbed in the playing of demi-semi-quavers. This seems an unnecessary refinement and it is recommended that all such notes should be rounded up to the nearest semi-quaver, thus making it possible for trainees and lower grade operators to be used.
- d) There is no useful purpose in the horns repeating the passage already handled by the strings. If all such redundant passages were eliminated, the time taken for the work could be reduced from two hours to twenty minutes.

Conclusion:

If Schubert had attended to these matters, the symphony would probably not have needed to remain unfinished after all.

Hugh's News

Birding with Hugh (Part 2)!

In the last edition of The Voice we left Tommy and Tina starting to prepare a nest on the 19th March. I say Tommy and Tina but in truth since then Tina has done all the work?

I hear some say "Isn't that always the case....." but I could not possibly comment! (continued on next page) I have shared my nest box App with my nine year old grandson and he could not believe how industrious Tina was over the next few days and it gave him a real insight in to something he had previously taken for granted.

To assist in the nest building I left a pile of straw on one of the bushes in the garden and Tina selected some pieces for the initial structure. She then added lots of leaves and moss and finally diverse feathers as a lining. In just five days she had filled the box!





It is difficult to say for sure when Tina laid her first egg but I spotted one for the first time on March 28th. Female blue tits typically lay one egg per day until their clutch is complete, which usually consists of 8-12 eggs.



At a hefty 1 gram each, a blue tit egg weighs in at a tenth of its mother's total body weight. She does not begin incubating her eggs until the last one is laid, which means her first could lie dormant fora fortnight before development of the embryo inside begins. Tina did a good job in keeping them well hidden, but I managed to count at least eight with the possibility of a couple more.



The female spends up to 15 days incubating using a featherless area of skin on her tummy called a brood patch to keep the eggs warm. Her partner is meant to bring her deliveries of food during this time but unfortunately there seemed to be no sign of Tommy, and Tina occasionally left the eggs to feed herself.

She also decided to incubate the eggs right at the bottom of the box so it has been difficult to follow the action over the last couple of weeks.

(Note to myself to adjust focus of camera before next year!)



I was beginning to worry that with Tommy apparently gone AWOL, Tina might struggle to successfully incubate the eggs, but I was thrilled when the chicks began to hatch on Easter Saturday with others following on Easter Sunday. And lo behold Tommy suddenly reappeared passing food to Tina to feed the babies....



I still do not know how many there are but all will be

Parcel deliveries

These scams often begin with text messages or emails claiming to be from delivery services stating that you have a package waiting, or that there's an issue requiring your attention and pre-payment is required.

Engaging with these can lead to identity theft and/or financial loss.

- Verify delivery notifications: Always check directly with the delivery company through their official website or app rather than clicking on links in unsolicited messages.
- Avoid unsolicited packages: If you receive a package you didn't order or a request to pay for an unsolicited delivery, be cautious. Report any such incidents to the delivery company and avoid interacting with suspicious messages.

NB

- If it sounds too good to be true, it probably is!!
- NEVER give out personal banking details, especially PIN numbers.

If you are asked for these you are almost certainly being scammed.

- Do not click on links in Emails if you are not absolutely certain who they are from.
- Telephone scams: Fraudsters often masquerade as your Bank/ the Police/HMRC etc.....

If a caller suggests that you phone the Customer Services number on the back of your bank card to confirm that they are who they say they are – DO NOT do this. The fraudster keeps the line open and you will be speaking with them again, <u>not</u> your bank!

Instead, hang up, then check with your bank to confirm that it was a scam.

My most recent scam email purported to be re. my TV license, saying that I needed to renew it immediately through a link, as it would expire in 2 days. This was not true, and on checking the email address it came from, it was that of a Moroccan Travel Agency!!!!!

I also got a parcel delivery scam text this month pretending to be from EVRI.
