During the service Gill Vinall told us how she came to Merrow Methodist Church 70 years ago:

'My Mum and I were homeless and housed in the flats on Merrow Downs waiting for the Bushy Hill Estate to be built. We went to a little Congregational Church in High Path Road.

When we were moved to Bushy Hill we still went to the church, and as we walked up we passed two of the families coming to Merrow Methodist Church. One day they asked us if we were going to church. They invited us to come to Merrow Methodist Church and we said we would when the Congregational Church closed, which we did and the few people left there came as well. There was so much going on; Sunday School, Youth Club in the week and after Sunday evening service, Girl's Club, Boys Club, Men's Group, Mothers and Babies, Bible Study etc...

Roy's family came to Guildford and his dad's secretary was Audrey Heath and they came to the church and I met Roy. We were married in what is now the church hall in 1966. Our twin daughters were christened in this church in 1969 on a very cold day and the heating wasn't working.

When Rev. Wallis White had christened them he said that Gill and Roy are to take them home as it is so cold, but the rest would stay for the rest of the service! On this special day for Merrow Methodist Church we all have a special day, the first time we came to a service here and I would like us to celebrate that as well.

I am so glad I came on that day.'

Our Anniversary Day celebration continued after the service with lunch in the hall.

Merrow Savouries catered for us, and old friends and new met and chatted together over the splendid selection of food.

Sheila rarely missed those opportunities!


I would like to quote a few lines from the Families tribute.



ADVERTS

Fraudsters are buying up adverts that appear at the top of search results when shoppers look up popular retailers on Google.

Recently there have been reported in Which magazine examples of such scam ads when searching for Next, TK Maxx and Zara.

LOFT INSULATION CALLS

There are still reports of someone claiming to be from Surrey County Council saying that they are a conservation officer and trying to sell you loft insulation. Local Authorities do not do this, please hang up!

PHONE COMPANIES

According to experts at secure card payments provider, **Dojo**, the most recent phone bill scam includes a range of legitimate-looking communications through email, text and social media, notifying consumers and businesses that they can benefit from reduced phone bill charges as part of a monthly contract. The scam will then ask for card details to receive the discounted phone bill. "Having acquired the stolen card details, scammers are then using them to make lavish online purchases, and empty bank accounts, causing a huge financial and psychological impact on victims.
