

Dear Friends,

Have you ever had an experience where one of the stories that you've read in scripture suddenly comes to life in a very real and yet unexpected way?

I had one of these just last week when I met the Good Samaritan and his name was Peter. Well, I suppose 'A' Good Samaritan would be more accurate, but he was well named, wasn't he? If THE Peter, the disciple, that first friend of Jesus, was someone that Jesus felt he could build his church upon; then this Peter could be a good/solid Samaritan I'm quite sure...Except he's probably quite an unlikely 'Good Samaritan' and would, I guess, never call himself by such a name.

Let me explain...

I met Peter in the hotel foyer of The Elliott Hotel, whilst in Gibraltar on District duties. I was there to lead worship one Sunday and then welcome the new minister on the following weekend. Peter was on holiday with his wife, celebrating his birthday and meeting up with his buddies from his naval service days and it was going to be a 'heavy day' in the pubs, according to his missus.

He greeted me with a broad Sunderland inflexion 'Heh – here's the Vic-ar! She'll knaa what t'do!' whilst wearing the t-shirt (see below).



Peter had been out for an early morning stroll (before he attacked the pubs!) and found a lonely little lady called Lucy wandering and lost outside of the Roman Catholic Cathedral. Originally from the Philippines, she was in Gibraltar visiting friends and thought she'd attend church but got there rather too early and then couldn't find her way back. All she had was a scrap of paper with a flat number but no address. She was lost, alone and vulnerable.

And, I've no doubt some people must have walked past her: too busy, too

distracted, too 'I'm not getting involved!', but not Peter – this 'Good/Grumpy Samaritan', he was the one who came to her aid.

He brought her back to the hotel and was talking with the reception staff to see if they could track her way back to her accommodation, when I joined the group and got the cheery, if misplaced greeting above.

I didn't have much to bring to the party, as they say – certainly not in terms of helping her find her way home but with some expert detective work on behalf of the Receptionist and Peter and I looking at her little scrap of paper, eventually we managed to identify sufficient

details to give her a name of a tower block that she recognised and could tie that in to the name of the owner, who Lucy recognised as the friend she was staying with.

Now Lucy had where she needed to be, but without a map or even a mobile phone and seemingly quite confused with directions, Peter offered to walk her all the way to her accommodation.

What a kind man: what a Good Samaritan.

He may not have looked like the one I imagine as I read Luke 10:25-37 but there he was – helping someone that others had ignored; someone vulnerable and in need; going out of his way to make sure she was safe, cared for and brought to a place of security and provision and then extending that care to ensure her longer term restoration to where she needed to be.

It just shows you (or maybe it just shows me!) that these stories of scripture aren't just ancient tales of yester-year, or even many thousands of years but around us all the time, when we have eyes to see, ears to hear and hearts/minds to understand – God's Story breaks in, all over the place – even in people like Peter, Lucy's Good Samaritan from Sunderland in Gibraltar... 'Canny job, bonny lad!'


