
UNLOCK LONDON WALK 27th April 2024



The Hare & the Tortoise

No this is not the name of a pub in Essex, rather a famous Aesop fable recorded around 600 BC.

The narration containing a strong moral philosophy is well known but Jane Briggs recently used it as a base for her Sunday School talk - we are all children of God (!) - followed by references to it in her later sermon. Advance another 200 years and we are in the great age of Greek mathematicians and philosophers. Pythagoras,

Euclid, Aristotle, Pericles etc. A long debate about this story and one or two others puzzled the hierarchy and was only solved when giants, not Goliath, such as Newton, Leibniz and Descartes came along during late 16th and 17th century.

The idea was that assuming the hare effectively ran at a constant speed over a known distance it would cover half the race in a specific time. It would then cover half the remaining distance in a commensurate, uniform calculation. This process was argued for each and every half the distance left. It sounds simple but the hare never reaches the finish line. It inevitably approaches nearer and nearer to it. This is all now obvious to us but the Greeks could not resolve a contradiction based on mathematics versus completed physical energy.

Without plunging into advanced applied sciences, the race conundrum provided the beginnings of mathematical calculus developed during the great Reformation. It broadly concerned the problem of an infinite solution within a confined space. We owe a lot to those heady days of Greek expansion.

SCAMS

We all want to give and receive love, unfortunately scammers understand this Only too well

Holiday scams - book through known agencies.

Bookings for private accommodation may be suspect, such as Air B&B bookings and villas. Thesesometimes do not actually exist.

Scam texts & Emails from criminals often claim they need money for emergency medical care, or to pay for transport costs to get home if they are overseas.

These can claim to be from relatives or close friends whose phones are stolen or broken. These SCAMS are getting more common.

Fraudsters are also likely to exploit the concerns around gas prices in various ways, eg.

- Knocking on your door offering scam deals,
- phone calls around new gas takeovers or
- phishing emails and texts asking you to update personal and/or financial information.

If an offer sounds too good to be true, it probably is!
If you are asked for personal details, especially bank details, DO NOT give them.

Lloyds Bank estimates that more than £1 million could have been lost in the UK to fraudsters selling fake Taylor Swift tickets.

The warning comes after the bank received over 600 scam reports from its customers.

To avoid ticket scams:

Stick to official retailers and competitions.

Be wary of buying tickets from sellers on social media as many ticket scams begin on these platforms.

Be suspicious of too good to be true prices.

Don't pay via bank transfer as you'll have a hard time being reimbursed if you do.
